

AIDS 2010 – 'RIGHTS HERE, RIGHT NOW!'

20,000 participants working in the field of HIV, world leaders, policymakers, scientists and people living with HIV from 190 countries gathered in Vienna for the XVIII International AIDS Conference from 18 – 23 July, 2010. The theme of AIDS 2010, "Rights Here, Right Now!", was chosen to emphasize the critical connection between human rights and HIV. The protection of human rights for those most vulnerable to HIV is crucial in slowing down and eventually ending the pandemic.

UNODC – AIDS 2010 INTERNATIONAL PARTNER

UNODC, the lead agency in UNAIDS for HIV prevention, treatment, care and support for injecting drug users and in prison settings, supported AIDS 2010 as international partner. The Office is helping to provide drug users, prisoners and people vulnerable to trafficking with comprehensive, evidence-informed HIV services. HIV prevention among drug users and prisoners were highlighted throughout the Conference by many prominent speakers like former US President Bill Clinton and UN Special Rapporteur on Torture Manfred Nowak.

TREATMENT - NOT PUNISHMENT

Vienna was selected as the Conference site for its proximity to Eastern Europe, the Baltic states and Central Asia, where HIV is spreading rapidly, largely through unsafe injecting drug use. Sharing needles and injection equipment is thought to be three times more likely to transmit HIV than sexual intercourse.

An HIV epidemic among injecting drug users can be prevented, halted and reversed. Yet injecting drug users often have little or no access to HIV services:

- Globally, only 2 needles or syringes per injecting drug user are distributed per month.
- Among hundred injecting drug users only 8 receive opioid substitution therapy.
- Only 4 out of hundred HIV-positive injecting drug users receive antiretroviral therapy.

UNODC supports countries to adopt supportive policy, legal and social environments and implements evidence-informed programmes to ensure equitable access to HIV services for drug users and to reduce stigma and discrimination and promote adherence to the human rights of drug users.

PRISONS - HOTSPOTS FOR AIDS PANDEMIC

I urge authorities to inform prisoners of the risk of HIV transmission and offer them free condoms, HIV testing and counselling and encourage prisons to offer needle and syringe programs and opioid substitution therapies."

Prisons around the world are besieged with HIV infections acquired from overcrowding, unsafe drug use, sexual intercourse, tattooing and medical services. The disease rates in prisons are up to 100 times higher than in a general community. This situation is often accompanied and exacerbated by high rates of other infectious diseases such as hepatitis and tuberculosis, as well as poor prison conditions. Effective policies to prevent HIV inside prisons and other correctional institutions are often hampered by the denial of factors that contribute to the spread of HIV.

UNODC supports countries to ensure that health care and HIV prevention, treatment and care services for prisoners are equivalent to those available in the community. The Office assists countries to provide confidential and voluntary counselling, testing, psychosocial support, and the means to prevent HIV, including condoms and sterile injecting equipment.
